2016 CCIC ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The 2016 CCIC Annual Conference, May 10-12, at the Wabano Centre for Aboriginal Health presented a milestone opportunity for the Canadian international development community to come together and explore the changing landscape of both national and global development contexts, and to take a hard look at how the sector needs to adapt to take full advantage of the unfolding context.



At the Wabano Centre in Ottawa, stakeholders explored if Canadian CSOs are "fit for purpose" in the new national and global development space, which includes Agenda 2030 and the new Sustainable Development Goals, the Paris Agreement on Climate Change, and a new government which presents new opportunities for consultation, program development, policy review and leadership related to global issues and global development cooperation.

AWARDS

On May 16, 2016, CCIC awarded four prizes to Canadian civil society organizations (CSOs) working in international development.

The Karen Takacs Award is presented annually to an individual who has made a difference in the lives of women globally. For the Canadian global cooperation community, the award is a symbol of feminism, collaboration, advocacy, mentorship, and resilience.

The inaugural award was launched in 2016 and recognized the achievements of Karen Takacs, Crossroads International Executive Director from 2001 to 2015



NEXT GENERATION PROGRAM
